A Moment for All Ages

Gospel Reading

John 2.1-11

Three days later there was a wedding in the village of Cana in Galilee. Jesus' mother was there. Jesus and his disciples were guests also. When they started running low on wine at the wedding banquet, Jesus' mother told him, "They're just about out of wine."

Jesus said, "Is that any of our business, Mother—yours or mine? This isn't my time. Don't push me." She went ahead anyway, telling the servants, "Whatever he tells you, do it."

Six stoneware water pots were there, used by the Jews for ritual washings. Each held twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus ordered the servants, "Fill the pots with water." And they filled them to the brim. "Now fill your pitchers and take them to the host," Jesus said, and they did. When the host tasted the water that had become wine (he didn't know what had just happened but the servants, of course, knew), he called out to the bridegroom, "Everybody I know begins with their finest wines and later, after the guests are drunk, brings in the cheap stuff. But you've saved the best till now!"

This act in Cana of Galilee was the first sign Jesus gave, the first glimpse of his glory. And his disciples believed in him.

Now Testament Reading

The First Baptism, from

"The Chronicles of the Hutterian Brethren"

At this point came a priest named Georg, later known as Georg Blaurock. He was given this name because he had worn a blue coat. This same Georg had come because of his extraordinary zeal. Everyone thought of him as a plain, simple priest; but he was moved by God's grace to holy zeal in matters of faith and worked courageously for the truth. He was told that there were other men more on fire than Zwingli. He inquired eagerly about them and met with Conrad Grebel and Felix Manz, to talk about questions of faith.

One day when they were meeting, fear came over them and struck their hearts. They fell on their knees and prayed that God...might have mercy on them. Neither flesh and blood nor human wisdom compelled them. They were well aware of what they would have to suffer for this.

After the prayer, Georg Blaurock stood up and asked Conrad Grebel to baptize him with true Christian baptism on his faith and recognition of the truth. With this request, he knelt down, and Conrad baptized him. Then the others turned to Georg in their turn, asking him to baptize them, which he did. They confirmed one another for the service of the Gospel and began to teach the faith and keep it. Soon after this, more people joined them, like Balthasar Hubmair and Ludwig Haetzer, and other scholars of German, Latin, Greek and Hebrew, well acquainted with the Scriptures, as well as priests and preachers and other people. Soon they all gave witness with their blood.

Now Testament Reading Bend Toward Justice, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

I must confess, my friends, that the road ahead will not always be smooth. There will still be rocky places of frustration and meandering points of bewilderment. There will be inevitable setbacks here and there. And there will be those moments when the buoyancy of hope will be transformed into the fatigue of despair. Our dreams will sometimes be shattered and our ethereal

hopes blasted. We may again, with tear-drenched eyes, have to stand before the bier of some courageous civil rights worker whose life will be snuffed out by the dastardly acts of bloodthirsty mobs. But difficult and painful as it is, we must walk on in the days ahead with an audacious faith in the future.

...Let this affirmation be our ringing cry. It will give us the courage to face the uncertainties of the future. It will give our tired feet new strength as we continue our forward stride toward the city of freedom. When our days become dreary with low-hovering clouds of despair, and when our nights become darker than a thousand midnights, let us remember that there is a creative force in this universe working to pull down the gigantic mountains of evil, a power that is able to make a way out of no way and transform dark yesterdays into bright tomorrows. Let us realize that the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice.

- "Peace Theology in Movement" is the theme of a <u>weekly lunchtime colloquium series</u> that will focus on the Mennonite Action movement as an expression of Mennonite peace theology. The series —held via Zoom on Wednesdays, Jan. 15 April 30, 12–1p Eastern is a collaborative effort of Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) and Mennonite Action. Mennonite Action is "a movement of Mennonites taking public action for a free Palestine and the liberation of all God's children."
- ECOLOGY TIP: All packaging has environmental drawbacks paper comes from trees, metals must be mined, and plastics are made from fossil fuels. Reducing packaging has tremendous potential to save water, reduce climate impacts, and even save businesses money. Now is a great time to lobby companies to package their items in more earthfriendly wrapping (or no packaging at all). Costco or Trader Joe's are excellent places to start, since they wrap many of their vegetables and fruits in plastic.
