New Testament Reading

While Peter was traveling throughout Judea, Galilee, and Samaria, he also went to the saints living in Lydda. There he found a person named Aeneas, who was paralyzed and had been bedridden for eight years. Peter said to him, "Aeneas, Jesus, God's Anointed, heals you. Get up and make your bed." Aeneas got up at once. All the inhabitants of Lydda and Sharon, upon seeing him, were converted to Jesus.

Now in Joppa there was a disciple, a woman named Tabitha –"Dorcas" in Greek—who never tired of doing kind things or giving to charity. About this time she grew ill and died. They washed her body and laid her out in an upstairs room. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples sent two couriers to Peter with the urgent request, "Please come over to us without delay." Peter set out with them as they asked.

Upon his arrival, they took him upstairs to the room. All the townswomen who had been widowed stood beside him weeping and showed him the various garments Dorcas had made when she was still with them. Peter first made everyone go outside, then knelt down and prayed. Turning to the body, he said, "Tabitha, stand up." She opened her eyes, then looked at Peter and sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her to her feet. The next thing he did was to call in those who were believers—including the widows—to show them that she was alive. This became known all over Joppa and, because of it, many came to believe in Jesus, the Anointed.

Gospel Reading

The time came for Hanukkah, the Feast of the Dedication, in Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was walking in the Temple area, in Solomon's Porch, when the Temple authorities surrounded him and said, "How long are you going to keep us in suspense? If you really are God's Anointed One, tell us plainly."

Jesus replied, "I did tell you, but you don't believe. The work I do in my Abba's name gives witness in my favor, but you don't believe because you're not my sheep. **My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never be lost. No one will ever snatch them from my hand.** Abba God, who gave them to me, is greater than anyone, and no one can steal them from Abba God. For Abba and I are One."

<u>Mountain States Mennonite Conference ASSEMBLY:</u> Reminder that early bird registration is due by 5/31 for this summer's Assembly (the annual meeting of our regional Mennonite conference). The presentation and video that Susan showed a couple of weeks ago is here—check it out if you didn't see it! A good number of BMCers will be attending!

Mennonite Disaster Service VOLUNTEERS NEEDED: MDS extends a plea for a few volunteers to bring hope to people in New Mexico July 21-25. Those suffering after the Calf Canyon/Herman's Peak fire near Las Vegas, NM just commemorated 1000 days since the fire. To date they have received no help except from MDS and a group from the Christian Reformed Church. Just three volunteers would make such a difference, bringing hope to this place of despair. Could you and a friend or two come and help clear slash or begin rebuilding? Food and lodging are paid for for volunteers, you don't need any special skills. We can train you for whatever is needed. Even if you could come for a couple of days, that would be helpful. Or might you find joy in cooking for the volunteers for a couple of days? Perhaps our church can adopt a meal or two or send down 40 brownies or several pans of lasagna? We are so grateful for those who have helped on this and other projects recently! ANABAPTIST DISABILITIES NETWORK rejoices for **a grant of \$1.2 million** from the Lilly Foundation for our project, *All In: Immersive Worship for Everybody*, a five-year collaborative learning project with congregations to create intergenerational worship services that are accessible to all, regardless of age or abilities. SIGN A PETITION FOR HAITI: The humanitarian situation in Haiti is dire and worsening every day. Despite this context, MCC partners persist in serving their communities and <u>building peace</u> <u>in Haiti</u>. MCC and other faith-based groups are **circulating a <u>petition</u>** addressed to Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem, urging her to prevent further harm and injustice in Haiti.

REMEMBERING THE MISSING AND MURDERED: On May 4, Koinonia Indian Mennonite Church, Clinton, Oklahoma, held a **service of remembrance for missing and murdered Indigenous peoples**. Monday, May 5 was the official day of observation for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women/People. According to the <u>Office for Victims of Crime</u>, Indigenous persons experience disproportionately high rates of violence and are reported missing or are murdered at high rates. The congregation displayed a red banner and wore red ribbons with black braids that read, "Say her name." "We honored those who cannot speak for themselves," explained Susan Hart, pastor and MC USA Executive Board member

UPDATE ON MENNONITE CHURCH USA V. HOMELAND SECURITY LAWSUIT: At

the first hearing on April 4, the judge denied our coalition's motion for preliminary injunction in the <u>Mennonite Church USA et. al. v. United States Department of Homeland Security et.</u> <u>al.</u> lawsuit. This motion sought to limit Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)/Customs and Border Patrol (CBP) enforcement actions in and around houses of worship while the case is being adjudicated. However, the judge did allow our legal team at Georgetown Law's Institute for Constitutional Advocacy and Protection to present additional information. We then filed a Joint Status Report, which told the federal district court in Washington, D.C. that we plan to file a renewed preliminary injunction motion with additional evidence. Now the Court set a schedule for briefing on that motion. We will file our renewed motion on June 2; the government will respond on June 25; and we will file our final reply by July 9. - **<u>CASA DE PAZ</u>**: Casa de Paz in Aurora welcomes recently released newcomers, asylum seekers, and immigrants; we facilitate their next steps towards reunifications with loved ones in a dignifying way. Watch a short video update about their work <u>here</u>.
- **EARTH'S TABLE GARDENS:** Jesus called us to feed the hungry. One way Boulder Mennonite has done this in the last few years is to support Earth's Table during planting and harvest seasons. One garden manager said, "Here come the Mennonites!" Would you be able to give a couple of hours to help plant tomatoes and peppers at Plumbumpy Garden? (7337 N. 63rd St.) May 27 and 28th will be the big planting days, starting at about 8:30 a.m. Let Cindy Firnhaber know if you plan to come, so Stan Stutzman, garden manager, will know. Experience the joy of working in the soil with other happy volunteers to provide good food for those in need!
- **ECOLOGY TIP**: As we all plant whatever we wish to see grow, whether vegetables, perennials, or annuals, keep in mind the most efficient way to keep them watered. Drip systems where the water goes directly to the seed or plant can save hundreds of gallons of water over the course of a summer. When choosing bushes or other perennial plants, keep in mind what their drought resistant quotient is, and choose those which benefit you through beauty or food with a minimum of water.
