Gospel Reading

Luke 17.11-19

It happened that as Jesus made his way toward Jerusalem, he crossed over the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten people, all lepers, met him. They kept their distance but raised their voices, calling out, "Jesus, Rabbi, have mercy on us!"

Taking a good look at them, Jesus said, "Go, show yourselves to the priests."

They went, and while still on their way, they were healed. One of them, realizing what had happened, turned around and came back, shouting in gratitude, glorifying God, then fell down at the feet of Jesus, so grateful. The person was a Samaritan.

Jesus said, "Were not ten healed? Where are the nine? Can none be found to come back and give glory to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up. On your way. Your faith has healed and saved you."

Marry and raise children. Find spouses for your daughters and your sons, that they may raise children and thrive, and not waste away. Seek the peace and the prosperity of the city to which I exiled you. Pray for the well-being of the city; for if it prospers, you will prosper."

To love the enemy is the ultimate act of gracious living. To reconnect with the enemy is to become an angel of grace—that is, to experience a profound vulnerability while resisting the temptation to respond defensively. It is to transcend self-preoccupation by looking deeply into one another and trusting what cannot be seen or is as yet unknown. It demands a readiness to forgive, just as we ourselves have been often forgiven, for just as violence stems from oppression, so grace bespeaks liberation.

Grace is the calm still center in the midst of violence. It is what enables us to empathize with the pain, ignorance, and need of the outcast in our midst. To live gracefully is to be "at home," to be in a "safe place" where even bombs and torture

cannot threaten.

<u>DID MARS ONCE HOST LIFE?</u> Exciting new results have emerged from Mars — could they be signs of ancient life? Join **Dr. Mike Tice**, astrobiologist and member of the Perseverance rover team, for a public presentation and Q&A, Sunday, November 9, 6pm at BMC. He will walk you through the newly announced findings from Jezero Crater showing traces in ancient rocks that may hint at past life. Dr. Tice will also compare these potential biosignatures with what we know about early Earth's life around the same era — how similar or different might life have been? **All are welcome!** Bring your curiosity—and your questions—about life in our solar system. **Spread the word!**

CARE PACKAGES TO ROCA: "I was a prisoner and you visited me." You may not be able to visit a detention center in San Antonio, but you can still do something to make a difference for our friends caught up in the immigration system there. Roca de Refugio Mennonite Church is inviting the rest of the conference to provide care packages for families who have a loved one in detention or in the deportation process. Possible items include: For adults: Cozy socks, cookies, hot chocolate, tea, mugs, candles, face masks, lotions, journal and pen, notes of support, etc. For kids: Stuffed animals, cozy socks, soft blanket, candy, cookies, coloring book/notebook and pen, activities book (with no or little English), etc. Pastor Randy, Carole Suderman and Brenda Fox

will be traveling to San Antonio in November – we will be able to take care packages with us! Bring your items to the church, and place in the box by the coat closet in the sanctuary. Thank you! Gracias!

<u>VIA MOBILITY SERVICES are Now Fare Free:</u> As of September 1, 2025, all rides with Via Mobility Services are free within their service area. This change removes a financial burden for many riders, more than 70 percent of whom live on less than \$30,000 a year.

ECOLOGY TIP: Over the past 25 years, EPIC—Ecumenical Project for International Cooperation— and its partners have planted 1,349,734 trees!
